Recommendation:

Waive the second reading and adopt <u>Ordinance No. 2023-03</u>, amending Chapter 15.12 – Flood Damage Prevention to Title 15 "Buildings and Construction" of the City Municipal Code.

Background & Overview:

On January 25, 2016, the Hughson City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2016-05, adding Chapter 15.12 – Flood Damage Prevention to Title 15 of the Hughson Municipal Code. In order to complete the application with the National Flood Insurance Program administered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency City staff modified the text of the Ordinance and addressed the Wastewater Treatment Plant property on Leedom Road which was left off of the initial application. The modified Ordinance was adopted on January 13, 2020. Furthermore, on June 28, 2021, Council adopted Ordinance 2021-06 amending Chapter 15.12 – Flood Damage Prevention to Title 15 "Buildings and Construction" of the City Municipal Code, due to modifications suggested by FEMA.

Discussion:

Since the adoption of the ordinance, staff have discovered some errors that require amendment prior to publication in the municipal code. The edits are as follows (highlighted):

Section 15.12.330(F) of Chapter 15.12 of Title 15 of the Hughson Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

"15.12.330(F). Restrictions in floodways. A variance shall not be issued for any proposed development in a floodway when any increase in flood levels would result during the base flood discharge, as evidenced by the applicable analysis required in Section HMC 15.12.320(C)(2) of these regulations."

Section 15.12.330(H)(1)(d) of Chapter 15.12 of Title 15 of the Hughson Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

"d. Complies with the wet floodproofing construction requirements of subsection (H)(2) of this section."

Section 15.12.410(D)(2) of Chapter 15.12 of Title 15 of the Hughson Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

"2. Where the subdivision has more than 50 lots or is larger than 5 acres and base flood elevations are not included on the FIRM, the base flood elevations shall be determined by the floodplain administrator in accordance with HMC 15.12 at the expense of the proposer of the subdivision."

Fiscal Impact:

There are no fiscal impacts with the adoption of this ordinance and code amendment.

CITY OF HUGHSON CITY COUNCIL ORDINANCE NO. 2023 - 03

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HUGHSON AMENDING MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 15.12 – FLOOD DAMAGE PREVENTION TO TITLE 15 "BUILDINGS AND CONSTRUCTION", SECTIONS 15.12.330(F), 15.12.3330(H)(1)(d), AND 15.12.410(D)(2) OF THE CITY MUNICIPAL CODE

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Hughson amended Title 15 of the Hughson Municipal Code on July 12, 2021, amending Chapter 15.12 of the Hughson Municipal Code (HMC) containing floodplain management regulations in Ordinance No. 2021-06.

WHEREAS, references in Ordinance No. 2021-06 contained three references to regulations that the City now desires to update and correct.

NOW, THEREFORE THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HUGHSON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

- **Section 1.** Section 15.12.330(F) of Chapter 15.12 of Title 15 of the Hughson Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:
 - **"15.12.330(F). Restrictions in floodways.** A variance shall not be issued for any proposed development in a floodway when any increase in flood levels would result during the base flood discharge, as evidenced by the applicable analysis required in Section HMC 15.12.320(C)(2) of these regulations."
- **Section 2.** Section 15.12.330(H)(1)(d) of Chapter 15.12 of Title 15 of the Hughson Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:
 - "d. Complies with the wet floodproofing construction requirements of subsection (H)(2) of this section."
- **Section 3.** Section 15.12.410(D)(2) of Chapter 15.12 of to Title 15 of the Hughson Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:
 - "2. Where the subdivision has more than 50 lots or is larger than 5 acres and base flood elevations are not included on the FIRM, the base flood elevations shall be determined by the floodplain administrator in accordance with HMC 15.12 at the expense of the proposer of the subdivision."

Section 4. This ordinance is not intended to and shall not be construed or given effect in a manner that imposes upon the City or any officer or employee thereof a mandatory duty of care toward persons and property within or without the city so as to provide a basis of civil liability for damages, except as otherwise imposed by law.

Section 5. If any provision of this ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are severable. The city council hereby declares that it would have adopted this ordinance irrespective of the validity of any particular portion thereof.

Staff Recommendations:

1. Adopt <u>Resolution No. 2023-40</u>, awarding the Walker Lane Improvement Project to Hensley Paving & General Engineering, Inc., in the amount of \$327,497.73 and authorizing a 10% construction contingency as well as a 10% set-aside for construction testing and inspections.

2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the final construction contract with the responsible low bidder, inclusive of any final edits by the City Attorney.

Background and Overview:

The Walker Lane Improvement Project was originally approved to go out to bid on January 25, 2021, the lowest responsible bidder was obtained, and the project was awarded on May 10, 2021, to McFadden Construction. This project is part of a multi-year effort to complete sidewalk infill projects to improve connectivity, mobility and access for non-motorized users of the City. This is a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) project and has been part of the City's project list since the 2020-2021, Annual Action Plan (AAP) prepared by the County. As a condition of funding, the project is required to obtain environmental clearance as well as an income survey of the area, which wasn't completed prior to awarding the project. Due to staff turnover and the pandemic, it became difficult to finalize both. Staff completed the requirements and is ready to start construction. Due to the inflation of construction material prices, the original bid could not be honored by the

contractor and Council authorized staff to rerelease bid documents on June 26, 2023, to obtain a new bid for the construction of the project.

This project will improve Walker Lane and will add curbs, gutter, and sidewalks to both sides of the street. The existing asphalt will be ground and milled so that a new sub-base and .2 feet of asphalt can be added to the roadway to match the grades of the new curb and gutter. The sidewalk on the north side of Walker Lane will be dead ended as it approaches Tully Road to facilitate future connections to a sidewalk along Tully Road. New storm drain drop inlets will be constructed and a connecting pipe will be installed to the existing storm drain system. The water valve covers and manholes will be raised/lowered to match the new roadway elevations. New striping of the centerline, stop bar, and stop legends will be added. All driveways to residents will be matched with similar material if needed.

The CDBG projects are meant to address housing and community development needs each year. Complete streets with accessible and walkable sidewalks are an important component of community development. Walker Lane is one of the last streets in the City that does not have sidewalks. The remaining streets without sidewalks will continue to be the focus of CDBG funds so that in the future all streets in Hughson will have adequate sidewalks and if possible, bike lanes, for all modes of pedestrian movement.

Discussion:

At the July 26, 2023 bid opening, six (6) sealed bids were received:

1.	Mc Fadden Construction, Inc.	\$376,301.75
2.	Knife River Construction	\$432,481.80
3.	Hensley Paving & General Engineering, Inc.	\$327,497.73

The engineer's estimate for the project was \$350,000.00 The award of the contract is to the lowest 'responsible' bidder. The apparent low bid has been analyzed by the City's contracted engineer and was determined to meet the City of Hughson's request for the project and has thus been considered 'responsible'.

Environmental:

The project is exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines (§ 15301(c), repair or minor alteration of existing streets, sidewalks, gutters, etc., with no expansion in capacity, and § 15301(d), restoration or rehabilitation of damaged structures or facilities...to meet current standards of public health and safety), additionally it falls under a Categorical Exclusion from the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) under the regulations of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) (24 CFR 58.35(a), rehabilitation, repair and improvements to public facilities and non-residential buildings with no change in land use, and changes in facility size or capacity not

exceeding 20% of existing facility).

Fiscal Impact:

The City has been collecting CDBG funds to be able to complete this project. Currently, there is \$882,742 in CDBG funds budgeted and available for this project. Staff is requesting a 10% construction contingency and a 10% construction management contingency; the total cost of the project will be \$392,997.27. If approved, Finance will adjust budget appropriations for the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Budget.

In the case of unit basis items, the amount set forth under the "Item Total" column shall be the product of the unit price bid and the estimated quantity for the item.

In case of discrepancy between the unit price and the total set forth for a unit basis item, the unit price shall prevail, except as provided in (a) or (b), as follows:

- (a) If the amount set forth as a unit price is unreadable or otherwise unclear, or is omitted, or is the same as the amount as the entry in the item total column, then the amount set forth in the item total column for the item shall prevail and shall be divided by the estimated quantity for the item and the price thus obtained shall be the unit price;

The Contractor agrees to post in visible places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.
- 2. The Contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex or national origin.
- 3. The Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representative of the Contractor's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in visible places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- The Contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 (Equal Employment Opportunity) of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- 5. The Contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 (Equal Employment Opportunity) of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations and orders.
- 6. In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 (Equal Employment Opportunity) of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 (Equal Employment Opportunity) of September 24, 1965, or by the rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- 7. The Contractor will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract or purchase order

unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to Section 204 of Executive Order 11246 (Equal Employment Opportunity) of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor.

C. Minority and Women Business Enterprise

The contractor, subrecipient or subcontractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. The contractor shall carry out applicable requirements of **24 CFR Part 85.3636(e)** in the award and administration of HUD assisted contracts. Failure by the contractor to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this contract, which may result in the termination of this contract or such other remedy as the recipient deems appropriate.

D. Compliance with Anti-Kickback Act (24 CFR 85.36 (i) (4))

This act also requires the assessment of liquidated damages at the rate of \$10 per day for each day that each laborer and mechanic worked without payment of the required overtime compensation. This act has no job site limitation.

H. Copyright and Patent Rights (24 CFR 85.36 (i) (8)(9))

No reports, handbooks, documents, maps, data, or pamphlets produced in whole or in part under this contract will be the subject of any application for copyright by, or on behalf of the contractor. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the County of Stanislaus, and/or Stanislaus Urban County awarding this contract shall possess all rights to invention or discovery, as well as rights in data which may arise as a result of the contractor's services.

I. Access to Records (24 CFR 85.36 (i) (10))

The Contractor shall maintain accounts and records, including personnel, property and financial

records, adequate to identify and account for all costs pertaining to this contract and such other records as may be deemed necessary by the grantee to assure proper accounting for all funds applicable to this contract. The County, City, U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their duly authorized representatives, shall have access to any books, documents, papers, and records of the contractor which are directly pertinent to this contract, for the purpose of making audit, examination, excerpts, and transcriptions.

J. Records Retention (24 CFR 85.36 (i) (11))

The Contractor shall retain all records pertaining to this contract for a period of five (5) years after final payments and all other pending matters are closed.

K. Compliance with Clean Air and Water Acts (24 CFR 85.36 (i) (12))

In carrying out this agreement, the contractor agrees to comply with the requirements of the Federal Clean Air Act (42 USC 7401 et seq.) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 USC 1251 et seq.), as amended. Such statutes and regulations prohibit the use under non-exempt federal contracts, grants or loans of facilities included on the Environmental Protection Agency's List of Violating Facilities.

L. Energy Conservation (24 CFR 85.36 (i) (13))

In carrying out this agreement, the contractor agrees to comply with the requirements of mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency which are contained in the State of California's energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the federal Energy Policy and Conservation Act (PL 94-163, 89 Statutes 871).

The work to be performed under this contract is on a project assisted under a program providing direct federal financial assistance from the Department of Housing and Urban Development and is subject to the requirements of Section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, as amended, 12 USC, 1701u. Section 3 requires that to the greatest extent feasible, opportunities for training and employment be given to lower income residents of the area of the Section 3 covered project, and contracts for work in connection with the project be awarded to business concerns which are located in, or owned in substantial part by persons residing in the area of the Section 3 covered project.

O. Title VI Civil Rights Act of 1964:

During the performance of this contract, the contractor, for itself, its assignees and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "contractor"), agrees as follows:

- 1. The contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, sex or national origin in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. - 4. In the event of the contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this contract, the Stanislaus Urban County (awarding agency) or the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development shall impose such contract sanctions as it may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
 - (a) Withholding of payments to the contractor under the contract until the contractor complies; and/or,
 - (b) Cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part.
- 5. The contractor shall include the provisions of paragraph (N1) through (N5) in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto. 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STANISLAUS COUNTY SECTION 3 PROCEDURES

As a recipient of U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) CDBG, HOME and other federal funds governed by Section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, Stanislaus County is dedicated to contracting with Section 3 contractors to the greatest extent possible. Subsequently, the County is also dedicated to the utilization of both MBE/WBE and LOSB concerns.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

As part of Public Hearings associated with the Consolidated Planning Process, Stanislaus County's Department of Planning and Community Development will provide those in attendance with information concerning Section 3 eligibility under its HUD entitlement programs. This will be carried out as a part of the public meetings discussing the Annual Action Plan and Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER).

WAGE SHEET AND CLASSIFICATION REVIEW

REVIEW OF PROJECT WAGE SHEET

Prior to the start of construction, all contractors are required to submit a **Project Wage Sheet**. This sheet will list all work classifications that the contractor will utilize to perform work under the contract. The form will also designate if the prevailing rate is a federal or state rate, list the basic hourly rate with the fringe benefit rate and the total of both. The Project Wage Sheet must be reviewed and approved by the project engineer with respect to the work classifications to be used for the construction phase of the project. Also, the Project Wage Sheet must be reviewed and approved by the Grantee's labor compliance officer with respect to the wage rates and fringe benefits rates that are to be paid for each work classification.

ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATIONS

Any class of laborers or mechanics not listed in the initial wage determination shall be additionally classified in conformance with the wage determination. If additional classifications under the federal wage determinations are required, the Labor Compliance Officer will submit a "Report of Additional Classifications and Rate" form, located online at: (portal.hud.gov/hudportal/documents/huddoc?id=DOC 12573.doc.).

The WVDO will forward the request to the HUD Area Office for submission and approval by the United States Department of Labor. A report on additional classification actions must be approved, modified or disapproved by the United States Department of Labor's Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, within 30 days of receipt.

MINIMUM CRITERIA FOR ADDITIONAL CLASSIFICATION REQUESTS

Additional classification will be approved only when the following criteria have been met:

- The work to be performed by the classification requested is not performed by a classification in the wage determination;
- 2. The classification is utilized in the area by the construction industry; and
- 3. The proposed wage rate, including any bona fide fringe benefits, that has a reasonable relationship to the wage rates contained in the wage determination.

WAGE PAYMENT COMPLIANCE

Payroll records shall contain the employee's full name and identifying number (<u>last four digits of the social security number</u>). The payroll records must also reflect correct classifications, hourly rates of wages paid, daily and weekly number of hours worked, bona fide plans or programs for providing fringe benefits, written evidence of registered or certified apprentice or trainee programs, registration of apprentices or trainees and ratios, and wage rates prescribed in these programs.

Signed weekly certified payrolls must be submitted for each week in which any contract work is performed. The primary contractor is responsible for the submission of copies of payrolls by all subcontractors. Each payroll must be accompanied by a Statement of Compliance (with Davis-Bacon and Copeland Anti-Kickback Act provisions) signed by the contractor or subcontractor. If the signatory on the Statement of Compliance is not an officer of the contractor's or subcontractor's company, the chief executive officer must prepare a letter on company letterhead assigning signatory authority to another individual, such as a payroll officer, to sign on his/her behalf.

PAYMENT OF FRINGE BENEFITS

Whenever the minimum wage rates prescribed in the contract for a class of laborers or mechanics includes a fringe benefit which is not expressed as an hourly rate, the contractor shall either pay the benefit as stated in the wage determination or shall pay another bona fide fringe benefit or an hourly cash equivalent.

Any payment of fringe benefits other than cash payment must be verified by the agency which received the payment. The contract file must contain a listing provided by the bona fide fringe benefit plan for each employee, verifying the payment made.

FAILURE TO PAY PREVAILING WAGES

In the event of a contractor's or subcontractor's failure to pay all or part of the wages required by the contract to any laborer or mechanic, including any apprentice or trainee, employed or working on the site of work or under the United States Housing Act of 1937 or under the Housing Act of 1949 in the construction or development of the project, the Grantee may after written notice to the contractor, sponsor, applicant or owner, take such action as may be necessary to cause the suspension of any further payment, advance or guarantee of funds until such violations have ceased.

FAILURE TO PAY OVERTIME COMPENSATION

In the event of violation of the overtime provision of the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, the contractor and any subcontractor responsible shall be liable for the unpaid wages and arty liquidated damages.

The County shall upon its own action or upon written request from the HUD withhold or cause to be withheld any money payable on account for work performed by the contractor or subcontractor. Also, money payable to the same contractor may be withheld from other federal contracts. This also applies to any other federally assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor. The amount of money withheld may be determined by the amount necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages.

DEBARMENT PROCEEDING

Whenever any contractor or subcontractor is found to be in aggravated or willful violation of the labor standards provisions of any applicable statutes or who have been found to have disregarded required obligations to employees under the Davis-Bacon Act, such contractors or subcontractors shall be ineligible to receive any federal contracts.

A. APPLICABILITY

The Project or Program to which the construction work covered by this Contract pertains is being assisted by the United States of America, and the following Federal Labor Standards Provisions are included in this Contract pursuant to the provisions applicable to such Federal assistance.

(1) MINIMUM WAGES

(i) All laborers and mechanics employed or working upon the site of the work will be paid unconditionally and not less often than once a week, and without subsequent deduction or rebate on any account (except such payroll deductions as are permitted by regulations issued by the Secretary of Labor under the Copeland Act (29 CFR Part 3)), the full amount of wages and bona fide fringe benefits (or cash equivalents thereof) due at time of payment, computed at rates not less than those contained in the wage determination of the Secretary of Labor (which is attached hereto and made a part hereof), regardless of any contractual relationship which may be alleged to exist between the contractor and such laborers and mechanics. Contributions made or costs reasonably anticipated for bona fide fringe benefits under Section 1(b)(2) of the Davis-Bacon Act on behalf of laborers or mechanics are considered wages paid to such laborers or mechanics, subject to the provisions of 29 CFR 5.5(a)(1)(iv); also, regular contributions made or costs incurred for more than a weekly period (but not less often than quarterly) under plans, funds, or programs, which cover the particular weekly period, are deemed to be constructively made or incurred during such weekly period.

Such laborers and mechanics shall be paid the appropriate wage rate and fringe benefits on the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed, without regard to skill, except as provided in 29 CFR 5.5(a)(4). Laborers or mechanics performing work in more than one classification may be compensated at the rate specified for each classification for the time actually worked therein: Provided, that the employer's payroll records accurately set forth the time spent in each classification in which work is performed. The wage determination (including any additional classification and wage rates conformed under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(1)(ii) and the Davis-Bacon poster (WH1321)) shall be posted at all times by the contractor and its subcontractors at the site of the work in a prominent and accessible place, where it can be easily seen by the workers.

(ii) Additional Classifications.

- (A) Any class of laborers or mechanics which is not listed in the wage determination and which is to be employed under the contract shall be classified in conformance with the wage determination. HUD shall approve an additional classification and wage rate and fringe benefits therefor only when the following criteria have been met:
 - (1) The work to be performed by the classification requested is not performed by a classification in the wage determination;
 - (2) The classification is utilized in the area by the construction industry; and
 - (3) The proposed wage rate, including any bona fide fringe benefits, bears a reasonable relationship to the wage rates contained in the wage determination.
- (B) If the contractor, the laborers and mechanics to be employed in the classification (if known), or their representatives, and HUD or its designee agree on the proposed classification and wage rate (including the amount designated for fringe benefits, where appropriate), a report of the action taken shall be sent by HUD or its designee to the Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division ("Administrator"), Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, Washington, D.C. 20210. The Administrator, or an authorized representative, will approve, modify, or disapprove every additional classification action within 30 days of receipt and so advise HUD or its designee or will notify HUD or its designee within the 30-day period that additional time is necessary. (Approved by the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") under OMB control number 1235-0023.)
- (C) In the event the contractor, the laborers or mechanics to be employed in the classification or their representatives, or HUD or its designee do not agree on the proposed classification and wage rate (including the amount designated for fringe benefits, where appropriate), HUD or its designee shall refer the questions, including the views of all interested parties and the recommendation of HUD or its designee, to the Administrator for determination. The Administrator, or an authorized representative, will issue a determination within 30 days of receipt and so advise HUD or its designee or will notify HUD or its designee within the 30-day period that additional time is necessary. (Approved by the Office of Management and Budget under OMB Control Number 1235-0023.)

- (D) The wage rate (including fringe benefits, where appropriate) determined pursuant to subparagraphs (1)(ii)(B) or (C) of this paragraph, shall be paid to all workers performing work in the classification under this Contract from the first day on which work is performed in the classification.
- (iii) Whenever the minimum wage rate prescribed in the contract for a class of laborers or mechanics includes a fringe benefit which is not expressed as an hourly rate, the contractor shall either pay the benefit as stated in the wage determination or shall pay another bona fide fringe benefit or an hourly cash equivalent thereof.
- (iv) If the contractor does not make payments to a trustee or other third person, the contractor may consider as part of the wages of any laborer or mechanic the amount of any costs reasonably anticipated in providing bona fide fringe benefits under a plan or program, Provided, that the Secretary of Labor has found, upon the written request of the contractor, that the applicable standards of the Davis-Bacon Act have been met. The Secretary of Labor may require the contractor to set aside in a separate account assets for the meeting of obligations under the plan or program. (Approved by the Office of Management and Budget under OMB Control Number 1235-0023.)
- (2) Withholding. HUD or its designee shall, upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the U.S. Department of Labor, withhold or cause to be withheld from the contractor under this contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other Federally-assisted contract subject to Davis-Bacon prevailing wage requirements which is held by the same prime contractor, so much of the accrued payments or advances as may be considered necessary to pay laborers and mechanics, including apprentices, trainees and helpers, employed by the contractor or any subcontractor the full amount of wages required by the contract. In the event of failure to pay any laborer or mechanic, including any apprentice, trainee or helper, employed or working on the site of the work, all or part of the wages required by the contract, HUD or its designee may, after written notice to the contractor, sponsor, applicant, or owner, take such action as may be necessary to cause the suspension of any further payment, advance, or guarantee of funds until such violations have ceased. HUD or its designee may, after written notice to the contractor, disburse such amounts withheld for and on account of the contractor or subcontractor to the respective employees to whom they are due. The U.S. Department of Labor shall make such disbursements in the case of direct Davis-Bacon Act contracts.

(3) Payrolls and basic records.

(i) Maintaining Payroll Records. Payrolls and basic records relating thereto shall be maintained by the contractor during the course of the work and preserved for a period of three years thereafter for all laborers and mechanics working at the site of the work. Such records shall contain the name, address, and social security number of each such worker, his or her correct classification(s), hourly rates of wages paid (including rates of contributions or costs anticipated for bona fide fringe benefits or cash equivalents thereof of the types described in Section 1(b)(2)(B) of the Davis-Bacon Act), daily and weekly number of hours worked, deductions made, and actual wages paid.

Whenever the Secretary of Labor has found, under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(1)(iv), that the wages of any laborer or mechanic include the amount of any costs reasonably anticipated in providing benefits under a plan or program described in Section 1(b)(2)(B) of the Davis-Bacon Act, the contractor shall maintain records which show that the commitment to provide such benefits is enforceable, that the plan or program is financially responsible, and that the plan or program has been communicated in writing to the laborers or mechanics affected, and records which show the costs anticipated or the actual cost incurred in providing such benefits.

Contractors employing apprentices or trainees under approved programs shall maintain written evidence of the registration of apprenticeship programs and certification of trainee programs, the registration of the apprentices and trainees, and the ratios and wage rates prescribed in the applicable programs. (Approved by the Office of Management and Budget under OMB Control Numbers 1235-0023 and 1215-0018)

(ii) Certified Payroll Reports.

(A) The contractor shall submit weekly, for each week in which any contract work is performed, a copy of all payrolls to HUD or its designee if the agency is a party to the contract, but if the agency is not such a party, the contractor will submit the payrolls to the applicant sponsor, or owner, as the case may be, for transmission to HUD or its designee. The payrolls submitted shall set out accurately and completely all of the information required to be maintained under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(3)(i), except that full social security numbers and home addresses shall not be included on weekly transmittals. Instead, the payrolls only need to include an individually identifying number for each employee (e.g., the last four digits of the employee's social security number). The required weekly payroll information may be submitted in any form desired. Optional Form WH-347 is available for this purpose from the Wage and Hour Division Web site at https://www.dol.gov/agencies/whd/forms or its successor site. The prime contractor is responsible for the submission of copies of payrolls by all subcontractors.

Contractors and subcontractors shall maintain the full social security number and current address of each covered worker, and shall provide them upon request to HUD or its designee if the agency is a party to the contract, but if the agency is not such a party, the contractor will submit the payrolls to the applicant sponsor, or owner, as the case may be, for transmission to HUD or its designee, the contractor, or the Wage and Hour Division of the U.S. Department of Labor for purposes of an investigation or audit of compliance with prevailing wage requirements. It is not a violation of this subparagraph for a prime contractor to require a subcontractor to provide addresses and social security numbers to the prime contractor for its own records, without weekly submission to HUD or its designee. (Approved by the Office of Management and Budget under OMB Control Number 1235-0008.)

- (B) Each payroll submitted shall be accompanied by a "Statement of Compliance," signed by the contractor or subcontractor or his or her agent who pays or supervises the payment of the persons employed under the contract and shall certify the following:
 - (1) That the payroll for the payroll period contains the information required to be provided under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(3)(ii), the appropriate information is being maintained under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(3)(i), and that such information is correct and complete;
 - (2) That each laborer or mechanic (including each helper, apprentice, and trainee) employed on the contract during the payroll period has been paid the full weekly wages earned, without rebate, either directly or indirectly, and that no deductions have been made either directly or indirectly from the full wages earned, other than permissible deductions as set forth in 29 CFR Part 3;
 - (3) That each laborer or mechanic has been paid not less than the applicable wage rates and fringe benefits or cash equivalents for the classification of work performed, as specified in the applicable wage determination incorporated into the contract; and
- (C) The weekly submission of a properly executed certification set forth on the reverse side of Optional Form WH-347 shall satisfy the requirement for submission of the "Statement of Compliance" required by subparagraph (a)(3)(ii)(b).
- (D) The falsification of any of the above certifications may subject the contractor or subcontractor to civil or criminal prosecution under Section 1001 of Title 18 and Section 3729 of Title 31 of the United States Code.
- (iii) The contractor or subcontractor shall make the records required under subparagraph (a)(3)(i) available for inspection, copying, or transcription by authorized representatives of HUD or its designee or the U.S. Department of Labor, and shall permit such representatives to interview employees during working hours on the job. If the contractor or subcontractor fails to submit the required records or to make them available, HUD or its designee may, after written notice to the contractor, sponsor, applicant, or owner, take such action as may be necessary to cause the suspension of any further payment, advance, or guarantee of funds. Furthermore, failure to submit the required records upon request or to make such records available may be grounds for debarment action pursuant to 29 CFR 5.12.

(4) Apprentices and Trainees.

(i) Apprentices. Apprentices will be permitted to work at less than the predetermined rate for the work they performed when they are employed pursuant to and individually registered in a bona fide apprenticeship program registered with the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration, Office of Apprenticeship Training, Employer and Labor Services, or with a State Apprenticeship Agency recognized by the Office, or if a person is employed in his or her first 90 days of probationary employment as an apprentice in such an apprenticeship program, who is not individually registered in the program, but who has been certified by the Office of Apprenticeship Training, Employer and Labor Services, or a State Apprenticeship Agency (where appropriate), to be eligible for probationary employment as an apprentice.

The allowable ratio of apprentices to journeymen on the job site in any craft classification shall not be greater than the ratio permitted to the contractor as to the entire work force under the registered program. Any worker listed on a payroll at an apprentice wage rate, who is not registered or otherwise employed as stated above, shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed. In addition, any apprentice performing work on the job site in excess of the ratio permitted under the registered program shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the work actually performed. Where a contractor is performing construction on a project in a locality other than that in which its program is registered, the ratios and wage rates (expressed in percentages of the journeyman's hourly rate) specified in the contractor's or subcontractor's registered program shall be observed.

Every apprentice must be paid at not less than the rate specified in the registered program for the apprentice's level of progress, expressed as a percentage of the journeymen hourly rate specified in the applicable wage determination. Apprentices shall be paid fringe benefits in accordance with the provisions of the apprenticeship program.

If the apprenticeship program does not specify fringe benefits, apprentices must be paid the full amount of fringe benefits listed on the wage determination for the applicable classification. If the Administrator determines that a different practice prevails for the applicable apprentice classification, fringe benefits shall be paid in accordance with that determination. In the event the Office of Apprenticeship Training, Employer and Labor Services, or a State Apprenticeship Agency recognized by the Office, withdraws approval of an apprenticeship program, the contractor will no longer be permitted to utilize apprentices at less than the applicable predetermined rate for the work performed until an acceptable program is approved.

(ii) Trainees. Except as provided in 29 CFR 5.16, trainees will not be permitted to work at less than the predetermined rate for the work performed, unless they are employed pursuant to and individually registered in a program which has received prior approval, evidenced by formal certification by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration. The ratio of trainees to journeymen on the job site shall not be greater than permitted under the plan approved by the Employment and Training Administration. Every trainee must be paid at not less than the rate specified in the approved program for the trainee's level of progress, expressed as a percentage of the journeyman hourly rate specified in the applicable wage determination. Trainees shall be paid fringe benefits in accordance with the provisions of the trainee program. If the trainee program does not mention fringe benefits, trainees shall be paid the full amount of fringe benefits listed on the wage determination unless the Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division determines that there is an apprenticeship program associated with the corresponding journeyman wage rate on the wage determination which provides for less than full fringe benefits for apprentices. Any employee listed on the payroll at a trainee rate who is not registered and participating in a training plan approved by the Employment and Training Administration shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the work actually performed.

In addition, any trainee performing work on the job site in excess of the ratio permitted under the registered program shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the work actually performed. In the event the Employment and Training Administration withdraws approval of a training program, the contractor will no longer be permitted to utilize trainees at less than the applicable predetermined rate for the work performed until an acceptable program is approved.

- (iii) Equal employment opportunity. The utilization of apprentices, trainees, and journeymen under 29 CFR Part 5 shall be in conformity with the equal employment opportunity requirements of Executive Order 11246, as amended, and 29 CFR Part 30.
- (5) Compliance with Copeland Act requirements. The contractor shall comply with the requirements of 29 CFR Part 3, which are incorporated by reference in this Contract.
- (6) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor will insert in any subcontracts the clauses contained in subparagraphs (1) through (11) in this paragraph (a) and such other clauses as HUD or its designee may, by appropriate instructions, require, and a copy of the applicable prevailing wage decision, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all the contract clauses in this paragraph.
- (7) Contract termination; debarment. A breach of the contract clauses in 29 CFR 5.5 may be grounds for termination of the contract and for debarment as a contractor and a subcontractor as provided in 29 CFR 5.12.
- (8) Compliance with Davis-Bacon and Related Act Requirements. All rulings and interpretations of the Davis-Bacon and Related Acts contained in 29 CFR Parts 1, 3, and 5 are herein incorporated by reference in this Contract.
- (9) Disputes concerning labor standards. Disputes arising out of the labor standards provisions of this Contract shall not be subject to the general disputes clause of this Contract. Such disputes shall be resolved in accordance with the procedures of the U.S. Department of Labor set forth in 29 CFR Parts 5, 6, and 7. Disputes within the meaning of this clause include disputes between the contractor (or any of its subcontractors) and HUD or its designee, the U.S. Department of Labor, or the employees or their representatives.

(10) Certification of Eligibility.

(i) By entering into this Contract, the contractor certifies that neither it (nor he or she) nor any person or firm who has an interest in the contractor's firm is a person or firm ineligible to be awarded Government contracts by virtue of Section 3(a) of the Davis-Bacon Act or 29 CFR 5.12(a)(1) or to be awarded HUD contracts or participate in HUD programs pursuant to 24 CFR Part 24.

- (ii) No part of this Contract shall be subcontracted to any person or firm ineligible for award of a Government contract by virtue of Section 3(a) of the Davis-Bacon Act or 29 CFR 5.12(a)(1) or to be awarded HUD contracts or participate in HUD programs pursuant to 24 CFR Part 24.
- (iii) Anyone who knowingly makes, presents, or submits a false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement, representation or certification is subject to criminal, civil and/or administrative sanctions, including fines, penalties, and imprisonment (e.g., 18 U.S.C. §§ 287, 1001, 1010, 1012; 31 U.S.C. §§ 3729, 3802.
- (11) Complaints, Proceedings, or Testimony by Employees. No laborer or mechanic, to whom the wage, salary, or other labor standards provisions of this Contract are applicable, shall be discharged or in any other manner discriminated against by the contractor or any subcontractor because such employee has filed any complaint or instituted or caused to be instituted any proceeding or has testified or is about to testify in any proceeding under or relating to the labor standards applicable under this Contract to his employer.

B. CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT

The provisions of this paragraph (b) are applicable where the amount of the prime contract exceeds \$100,000. As used in this paragraph, the terms "laborers" and "mechanics" include watchmen and guards.

- (1) Overtime requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work, which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics, shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which the individual is employed on such work to work in excess of 40 hours in such workweek, unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in such workweek.
- (2) Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages. In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in subparagraph B(1) of this paragraph, the contractor, and any subcontractor responsible therefor, shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory) for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in subparagraph B(1) of this paragraph, in the sum set by the U.S. Department of Labor at 29 CFR 5.5(b)(2) for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of 40 hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in subparagraph B(1) of this paragraph. In accordance with the Federal Civil Penalties Inflation Adjustment Act of 1990 (28 U.S.C. § 2461 Note), the DOL adjusts this civil monetary penalty for inflation no later than January 15 each year.
- (3) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. HUD or its designee shall, upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the U.S. Department of Labor, withhold or cause to be withheld from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract, or any other Federal contract with the same prime contract, or any other Federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages, as provided in the clause set forth in subparagraph B(2) of this paragraph.
- (4) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in subparagraph B(1) through (4) of this paragraph and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in subparagraphs B(1) through (4) of this paragraph.

C. HEALTH AND SAFETY

The provisions of this paragraph (c) are applicable where the amount of the prime contract exceeds \$100,000.

- (1) No laborer or mechanic shall be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous, or dangerous to his or her health and safety, as determined under construction safety and health standards promulgated by the Secretary of Labor by regulation.
- (2) The contractor shall comply with all regulations issued by the Secretary of Labor pursuant to 29 CFR Part 1926 and failure to comply may result in imposition of sanctions pursuant to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, (Public Law 91-54, 83 Stat 96), 40 U.S.C. § 3701 et seq.
- (3) The contractor shall include the provisions of this paragraph in every subcontract, so that such provisions will be binding on each subcontractor. The contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontractor as the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development or the Secretary of Labor shall direct as a means of enforcing such provisions.

1. Authorize the submission of the General Application for the Riverview Mobile Home Estates Consolidation Project.

Authorize the City Manager and their designee to execute the necessary documents to submit the General Package Application, inclusive of the City Attorney's edits.

Background:

Riverview Mobile Home Estates (RMHE) is a small community water system, located in Stanislaus County, CA, Water System No. 5000090. RMHE currently provides water services to 173 connections and a population of 540 residents. The annual median household income for the system is \$35,000, categorizing it as a Severely Disadvantaged Community (SDCAC).

In May 2016, the RMHE received a compliance order from the Stanislaus County Department of Environmental Resources (No. DER-16CO-006) for violation of the uranium MCL (Maximum Contaminant Level) of 10 mg/L. While RMHE financed several projects to address the water contamination problem, none of these efforts resulted in permanent results or prospects for sources that meet drinking water standards.

The State Water Resources Control Board, Division of Drinking Water (DDW) assigned Self-Help Enterprises (SHE) to RMHE on August 31st, 2020, to provide technical assistance and aid with their water contamination issues. From August 2020 to January 2023, Self-Help Enterprises and Black Water Consulting Engineers,

Inc. (Black Water) have been working with RMHE to identify and implement a longterm solution that will address their uranium contamination issues.

Discussion:

On January 23, 2023, the Hughson City Council adopted Resolution No. 2023-09 affirming the City of Hughson's commitment to supporting the RMHE Water Consolidation Project.

Consolidation projects are eligible for grant funding, regardless of the project category. The Division of Financial Assistance may approve up to \$80,000 per connection and 100% for good cause of the construction project. At 173 service connections, RMHE would be eligible for up to \$13 million. The 13 million grant can cover the extension of the water service from the Hughson water system to connect to RMHE, the necessary City of Hughson Water System Improvements, and the disconnection and destruction of the existing groundwater wells.

It is important to note that the State Water Resources Control Board – Division of Financial Assistance (DFA) will make their final determination of the recipient's project grant/loan and outline all conditions in the awarded funding agreement which cannot be definitively determined until the drinking water construction application is submitted and reviewed. The decision regarding the funding DFA will approve for the water project that is required in order for the City of Hughson to have a water allocation for RMHE is outstanding, as is a Disadvantaged Community Determination Survey for the City of Hughson. Submitting a General Application Package will ensure that a Water Board Project Manager is assigned to this project who can assist with questions as they come up and with the financial decision-making.

At this time, SHE has prepared the General Application and the City Manager is requesting authorization to execute the agreement.

Fiscal Impact:

Hughson staff would continue to work with the State Water Resources Control Board as needed to ensure that the best interests of the City are considered. The City contracted water engineer will be paid for by State project funding through Self-Help Enterprises.

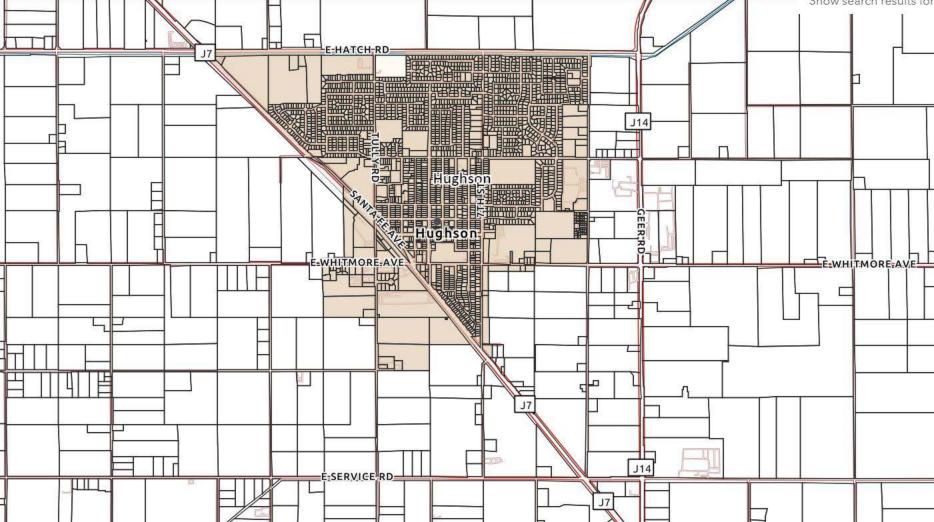

Staff Recommendations:

1. Adopt <u>Resolution No. 2023-41</u>, awarding the 2023 Surface Improvements Project to Dryco Construction, Inc., in the amount of \$1,355,158.60 and authorizing a 10% construction contingency and a 10% set-aside for construction testing and inspections.

2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the final construction contract with the responsible low bidder, inclusive of any final edits by the City Attorney.

Background and Overview:

In November 2016, Measure L, the countywide transportation sales tax measure passed with nearly 72 percent of the vote by residents in Stanislaus County. 65% of these funds go directly back to cities for local projects. The Measure L Local Streets and Roads tax is currently budgeted to bring \$390,000 annually in road tax dollars to the City of Hughson. For several years, Hughson has received more than what was anticipated, for example, in Fiscal Year 2020-2021, \$445,841 was received for the three accounts consisting of Local Streets and Roads, Traffic Management, and Bike and Pedestrian. In Fiscal Year 2021-2022, \$503,611 was received. Measure L is available through the year 2042.

Several projects have been completed in the past few years using Measure L funds, including grinding/milling the existing Santa Fe roadway. Since that time, the City has been holding funds anticipating the final Pavement Condition report and the

independent analysis with recommendations on how to use the road funding the City receives. The report was received and brought to Council on September 26, 2022, which approved the work as the Measure L Annual Project List for the years 2022-2024. Staff went out to bid for a contract to provide the roadwork for 2023-2024 in a single project to keep costs down. The work includes combinations of Type II Slurry Seal (approx. 2,500SF), 2' Grind Overlay (approx. 52,100 SF), the Dig Out and Replacement 3'AC / 6" AB (approx.11,350) and striping of various streets listed in the attached plans.

The sections of streets noted below have been omitted from any work and have been earmarked for completion once the active project affecting the streets has been completed.

- Pine Street, from 7th St to the east end, Portia Way, from Locust Street to Pine Street, and Locust Street, from Portia Way to Mariposa Drive are noted as areas where water lines need to be replaced. Once the water lines have been replaced the streets will be repaired, and street treatment will be applied.
- Walker Lane, from 1st to 2nd Street is noted as the City has an active project in that area and the road will be treated as part of the project.
- E. Whitmore, from Charles Street to Euclid Avenue has multiple street sections listed and is one of the worst roads in the City. Those sections have been noted as part of the active water consolidation project running water out to Geer Road. When the consolidation project is complete the road will be treated.

Discussion:

At the July 19, 2023 bid opening, six (6) sealed bids were received:

The engineer's estimate for the project was \$1,400,000.00. The award of the contract is to the lowest 'responsible' bidder. The apparent low bid by Dryco Construction, Inc. has been analyzed by the City's contracted engineer and was determined to meet the City of Hughson's request for the project and is considered 'responsible'.

Environmental:

The project is exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines (§ 15301(c), repair or minor alteration of existing streets, sidewalks, gutters, etc., with no expansion in capacity, and § 15301(d), restoration or

rehabilitation of damaged structures or facilities...to meet current standards of public health and safety), additionally it falls under a Categorical Exclusion from the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) under the regulations of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) (24 CFR 58.35(a), rehabilitation, repair and improvements to public facilities and non-residential buildings with no change in land use, and changes in facility size or capacity not exceeding 20% of existing facility).

Fiscal Impact:

The City has been collecting funds to be able to complete this project. Funds budgeted and available for this project are included in the Measure L Local Streets and Roads Tax - a current balance of approximately \$882,000, Public Facilities Streets Development Impact Fees – a current balance of \$605,810, Trench Cut Fees – a current balance of \$222,093, Gas Tax 2103 – a current balance \$257,253 and Gas Tax 2105 – a current balance of \$115,345. A total of approximately \$2,081,000 is available for this project. Staff is requesting a 10% construction contingency and a 10% construction management contingency for a total project cost of \$1,626,190.32.

Staff Recommendations:

- 1. Adopt <u>Resolution No. 2023-42</u>, confirming diagrams, assessments and reports and levying assessments for Fiscal Year 2023-24, for all Landscape and Lighting Districts and all Benefit Assessment Districts within the City of Hughson.
- 2. Direct the Harris & Associates Assessment Engineer to file, or cause to be filed, a certified copy of said Resolution and the report for each Assessment District with the Stanislaus County Tax Collector.

Background:

The City of Hughson utilizes special financing districts to provide various services and improvements to property owners within the City. The three different types of assessment districts are Landscaping and Lighting Districts (LLD), Benefit Assessment Districts (BAD), and one Community Facility District (CFD).

Each LLD is formed, and the annual assessments are levied, pursuant to the Lighting and Landscaping Act of 1972, Part 2 of Division 15 of the California Streets and Highways Code (the 1972 Act). The BADs are formed, and annual assessments are levied, pursuant to the Benefit Assessment Act of 1982 (the 1982 Act), Part 1 of Division 2 of the California Government Code. The Community Facilities District was formed, and the annual assessment is levied, pursuant to the Mello-Roos

Community Facilities Act of 1982, Part 1 of Division 2 of the 2014 California Government Code (the Act).

The City of Hughson has a Professional Service Agreement with Harris & Associates for the administration of the City's <u>24</u> assessment districts: (2) CFD, (15) LLD, and (7) BAD. This agreement includes administrative and engineering services. The annual assessments for the upcoming fiscal year will be considered for action by the Hughson City Council over two regular meetings to ensure reports are filed with Stanislaus County by August 2023 so the assessments can be placed on the Stanislaus County Property Tax Roll for the upcoming fiscal year. The meeting schedule is as follows:

• July 24, 2023 Direct the filing of the annual reports

• July 24, 2023 Consider the intention to levy and collect the

assessments and set a public hearing

August 14,2023 Hold the Public Hearing to confirm the intent to levy and

collect the assessments

City staff coordinates with Harris & Associates to administer the assessment districts. The City annually reviews the anticipated costs of maintaining each district for the next fiscal year, establishes assessments attributable to each parcel, and requires a specific assessment amount to be levied through the County property tax roll upon Council approval. An annual Engineer's Benefit Assessment (Report) for each district is prepared which describes the individual districts and incorporates any annexations or changes to the districts, the proposed assessments, and the proposed levies for the upcoming fiscal year. The proposed assessments and levies are based on the historical and estimated costs of providing services to maintain the improvements that provide a direct and special benefit to properties within each respective district. The costs of the improvements and the annual levies include all expenditures, deficits, surpluses, revenues, and reserves. In most districts, parcels are assessed proportionately for the special benefit provided by the district.

This process begins when the Council directs Harris and Associates to prepare the documents to file with the County, which is the purpose of Resolution No. 2023-37. The second step in this process is to preliminarily review the reports (attached) and approve a second resolution, Resolution No. 2023-38, which declares the Council's intent to levy and collect the assessments for Fiscal Year 2023-24 and set the public hearing for Council to approve or modify the Engineer's reports.

Following final approval of the Engineer's Reports and confirmation of the assessments, the City Council may order the levy and the collection of the assessments for the 2023-24 Fiscal Year pursuant to the 1972 and 1982 Acts. Once Council approves the levy and the collection of the assessments, the information will be submitted to the County Auditor-Controller in August 2023, to be included on the Tax Roll for each benefiting parcel for Fiscal Year 2023-24.

City staff worked with Harris & Associates to develop the proposed budgets for each assessment district and the attached Engineering Reports include the detailed budget information. The costs are a result of reviewing the original formation

documents, a validation of assessment rate history, and actual costs incurred. In preparation for the annual assessment process for Fiscal Year 2023-24, Harris & Associates and City staff determined that it would be appropriate to limit changes to the current district budgets based on fiscal necessity. Staff review the prior year's budget items, the current fund balances, and the allowable assessment amounts, and incorporate any necessary adjustments for each district. For Fiscal Year 2023-24, City staff continued work to minimize administrative costs and propose infrastructure improvements, as permitted, in districts with no structural deficits and healthy reserves.

Generally, authorized improvements and services within LLDs include maintenance landscaping, irrigation systems, street tree maintenance, removal, and replacement, graffiti removal, and street lighting maintenance and replacement as well as energy costs. Generally, authorized improvements and services within BADs include drainage infrastructure maintenance, retention basin maintenance, street sweeping, cleaning, maintenance and repairs, sidewalk maintenance and graffiti abatement.

In early 2020, staff proposed to hold a Proposition 218 Assessment Rate Increase election in the 2019-20 Fiscal Year which would take effect for the 2021-22 assessments to address the districts that are under-funded and that do not include annual inflationary adjustments. However, given the fiscal strain that the COVID-19 pandemic may have had on residents, staff decided to hold off on proposing an increase in assessment rates. City staff plan to pursue the Proposition 218 process to take effect in near future fiscal years. Should the Proposition 218 process be completed and approved by voters, this process will either implement an annual assessment rate escalator for those districts that lack an escalator and/or implement a rate increase to address deficiencies. Currently, seven LLDs lack an annual escalator and three carry significant negative fund balances. If increases are not approved, significant reductions in service levels will be required in these districts.

Annual Inflationary Adjustment:

The February Consumer Price Index (CPI) is used to determine the Maximum Assessment Rate each year. The February 2023 CPI was 5.30% (rounded). Increases to the annual assessment and levy are indexed to the Consumer Price Index plus three percent based on the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, reported by the San Francisco/Oakland/San José Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers increase. This will annually establish the new inflation-adjusted maximum assessment that may be levied without the necessity of conducting a Proposition 218 ballot proceeding. Although the maximum rate is likely to increase each year, the actual amount to be assessed is based on the annual budget and may be less than the maximum rate.

Public Participation:

Public participation is provided pursuant to the provisions of Proposition 218 for the tax levy of the Benefit Assessment Districts and the Landscape and Lighting Assessment Districts. A public hearing is not required for the Community Facilities District. Changes that require an affirming ballot process are not involved in this action. The scheduled Public Hearing provides impacted property owners the

opportunity to address the Council regarding any proposed changes to their assessments.

Fiscal Impact:

The Landscaping and Lighting Districts and the Benefit Assessment Districts provide the City of Hughson with funding annually to provide specific services and improvements to properties within their respective approved boundaries. For Fiscal Year 2023-24, annual assessments for LLDs and BADs are expected to generate approximately \$353,901 which goes towards the cost of labor, administration, utilities, equipment, materials, and preparation of the annual Engineer's Report.

The cost for Professional Services through Harris & Associates is budgeted annually at \$14,805 for the fiscal year 2023-2024.

PART III - DISTRICT DIAGRAMS

District Diagrams

The boundaries of Districts are shown on the maps in Appendix B. The lines and dimensions of each lot or parcel within the Districts are those lines and dimensions as shown on the maps of the Stanislaus County Assessor for the year in which this Report was prepared and are incorporated by reference herein and made part of this Report.



PART IV – METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

Method of Apportionment

The 1972 Act allows for the establishment of assessment districts by public agencies for the purpose of providing certain public improvements as detailed in Section I of this Report. The 1972 Act also requires that the cost of these improvements and services be assessed based on benefit received rather than by assessed value of the properties being assessed. In accordance with the 1972 Act, Section 22573:

"The net amount to be assessed upon lands within an assessment district may be apportioned by any formula or method which fairly distributes the net amount among assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits received by each such lot or parcel from the improvements"

The method of apportionment described in this Report, and confirmed by the City Council at the time of formation utilizes commonly accepted engineering practices which have been established pursuant to the 1972 Act and the California Constitution for the allocation of special benefit assessments. The calculation of assessments is based upon the parcel type and the services and improvements provided to equitably apportion the costs based on the special benefit received by each lot or parcel. The special benefit received by each lot or parcel is over and above any general benefit conferred upon said lots or parcels or to the public at large.

DESCRIPTION OF BENEFIT

Special Benefit

The improvements and associated costs have been allocated to the assessable properties within the Districts based upon the special benefit received by those properties, pursuant to the provisions of the 1972 Act and the California Constitution. The improvements for which the properties will be assessed have been identified as necessary, were required as a part of the development plans specifically for each individual tract and are also in compliance with the development plans and General Plan of the City. As such, the improvements and continuing maintenance and servicing are strictly the obligation of the properties within the Districts.

Definition of Special Benefit

The method of apportionment described in this Report is based on the premise that each assessable lot or parcel receives distinct and special benefits from the improvements and services provided, including the visual desirability provided by well-maintained landscaping. In accordance with Article XIII D, Section 4 of the California Constitution:

"Special benefit means a particular and distinct benefit over and above general benefits conferred on real property located in the District or the public at large"

Some of the special benefits associated with local landscaping and lighting improvements are:

- Enhanced desirability of properties due to proximity of the improvements.
- Improved aesthetic appeal provided by a positive representation of the development, neighborhood and the community.



- Improved ingress and egress to property resulting in enhanced traffic flow, reduced traffic accidents and consequent reduction in possible property damage.
- Improved traffic visibility and circulation.
- Improved accessibility for emergency vehicles.
- Reduced vandalism and other criminal activity.
- Enhanced environmental quality provided by adequate green space and other landscaping which helps moderate temperatures, reduce noise pollution and control dust and debris.

ASSESSMENT RANGE FORMULA

It is generally recognized that most budgetary items will be impacted by inflation in future years. In accordance with the California Constitution, Section 53739 (b)(1), assessments "may be adjusted for inflation pursuant to a clearly defined formula..." A formula for an inflationary adjustment is therefore included as part of the maximum assessment within the Districts that allow for such, and was approved by the property owner(s) at the time of formation/annexation. The formula, as described below, allows for annual adjustments to the assessments.

Generally, any new or increased assessment requires certain noticing and meeting requirements by law. The Brown Act excludes certain conditions of a new or increased assessment. These conditions include, "An assessment that does not exceed an assessment formula or range of assessments previously specified in the notice given to the public...and that was previously adopted by the agency..."

The initial maximum assessment for each District was established at the time of formation/annexation. The Brittany Woods, Rhapsody Unit 1, Santa Fe Estates Phase 1, Santa Fe Estates Phase 2, Starn Estates, Sun Glow Estates and Walnut Haven III Districts however, do not have an inflationary adjustment. These Districts were created prior to the adoption of Proposition 218 in 1996 and did not include a provision to increase the initial maximum assessment. The initial maximum assessments for the remaining Districts have been adjusted each fiscal year subsequent to the year of formation by the following Assessment Range Formula:

- The Maximum Assessment Rate allowed each fiscal year (the "Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate") shall be based on the initial maximum assessment, adjusted annually by Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index for the month of February, All Urban Consumers, ("CPI") for the San Francisco/Oakland/San Jose area, plus 3%. Should the Bureau of Labor Statistics revise or discontinue the preparation of such index, the City reserves the right to use such revised index or a comparable system to determine fluctuations in the annual cost of living.
- Each fiscal year, the February CPI amount, plus 3% has been applied to the Maximum Assessment Rate established the previous fiscal year to calculate the appropriate Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate for the then current fiscal year.
- If the proposed annual assessment rate for the upcoming fiscal year is less than or equal to the Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate established for that fiscal year, then the proposed annual assessment is not considered an increased assessment.



Beginning in the second fiscal year after the formation of a District, the Maximum Assessment Rate has been recalculated and a new Maximum Assessment Rate (Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate) has been established for each fiscal year using the Assessment Range Formula described above. The Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate has been calculated independent of the annual budget and proposed assessment rate for the given fiscal year. As stated above, if the proposed annual assessment for any fiscal year does not exceed the Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate for that year, it is not considered an increased assessment under the terms of Proposition 218.

The CPI increase for the one-year period ending in February 2023 is 5.30% (rounded). This amount, plus 3%, will be applied to the Maximum Assessment for the Central Hughson, Euclid North, Euclid South, Feathers Glen, Fontana Ranch North, Fontana Ranch South, Rhapsody II and Sterling Glen III Districts only, which will establish the Adjusted Maximum Assessment for each of these Districts for Fiscal Year 2022-23. The 2023-24 Maximum Assessment for each of these Districts is shown on the budget pages in Section III of this Report.

As stated above, the Brittany Woods, Rhapsody Unit 1, Santa Fe Estates Phase 1, Santa Fe Estates Phase 2, Starn Estates, Sun Glow Estates and Walnut Haven III Districts, do not currently have an inflationary adjustment.

To impose a new assessment or increased assessment in excess of the Maximum Assessment Rate for the current fiscal year, as provided by the preceding Assessment Range Formula, the City must comply with the provisions of the California Constitution, Article XIII D, Section 4c that requires a public hearing and certain protest procedures including mailed notice of the public hearing and property owner protest balloting. Property owners must approve the proposed new or increased assessment via a property owner protest balloting process before any such new or increased assessment can be imposed. A protest occurs when, at the public hearing, the returned assessment ballots opposed to the new or increased assessment outweigh the returned ballots in favor of the new or increased assessment, weighting those assessment ballots by the financial obligation of each parcel.

The definition of new or increased assessments includes any assessment which, 1) did not previously exist or, 2) exceeds a previously approved assessment amount or assessment range formula which has been adopted by the agency and approved by the property owners in the area where the assessment is imposed.

ASSESSMENT METHODOLOGY

The benefit formula used to determine the financial obligation for each parcel should be based on the improvements benefitting the parcels, as well as the use, or type, of each parcel as compared to other parcels that benefit from said improvements. One of the more common approaches to fairly distributing District costs to the benefitting parcels in maintenance districts such as this utilizes a methodology referred to as the Per Parcel method of apportionment. This method recognizes that each parcel within a particular District benefits equally from the improvements. This is typical when all parcels within the District are of the same type (ex. all single-family dwellings).

Other than Central Hughson, each District is comprised of a single parcel type – residential. The residential parcels are single-family residential parcels ("SFR") and as such are deemed to benefit equally from the improvements. The "Total Balance to Levy", as shown on the Budget pages, is divided equally among each assessable parcel within the District, determining the annual assessment rate per parcel for that District.

The Central Hughson District is comprised of several property types including single-family residential, commercial, agriculture and vacant. The costs are spread to those parcels based on the individual parcel size.



APPENDIX A – ASSESSMENT ROLL

Assessment Roll

Parcel Identification for each lot or parcel within the Districts shall be based on available parcel maps and other property data from the Stanislaus County Assessor's office as they existed at the time this Report was prepared and adopted by the City Council.

A listing of parcels assessed within each District for Fiscal Year 2023-24, along with the corresponding assessment amounts, is included on the following pages. If any parcel submitted for collection is identified by the County Auditor/Controller to be an invalid parcel number for the current fiscal year, a corrected parcel number and/or new parcel numbers will be identified and resubmitted to the County Auditor/Controller. The assessment amount to be levied and collected for the resubmitted parcel(s) shall be based on the method of apportionment and assessment rate approved in this Report. Therefore, if a single parcel has changed to multiple parcels, the assessment amounts applied to each of the new parcels shall be recalculated and applied according to the approved method of apportionment and assessment rate rather than a proportionate share of the original assessment.

Non-assessable lots or parcels include areas of public streets and other roadways (typically not assigned an APN by the County); dedicated public easements, open space areas and rights-of-way, including public greenbelts and parkways; utility rights-of-way; common areas; landlocked parcels; small parcels vacated by the County, bifurcated lots and any other property that cannot be developed or has specific development restrictions. These types of parcels are considered to receive little or no benefit from the improvements and are therefore, exempted from assessment

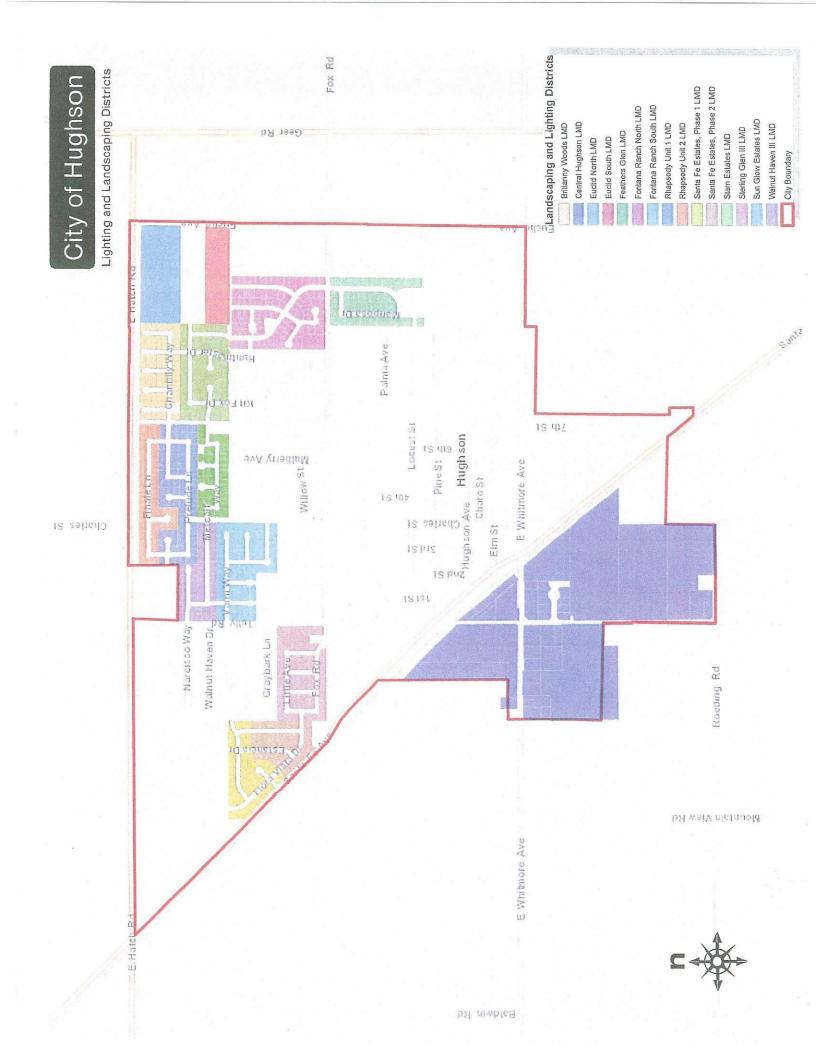

The lines and dimensions of each lot or parcel within the Districts are those lines and dimensions as shown on the maps of the Stanislaus County Assessor for the year in which this Report was prepared and are incorporated by reference herein and made part of this Report.



PART IV – METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

Method of Apportionment

The 1982 Act allows for the establishment of assessment districts, by public agencies, for the purpose of providing certain public improvements as detailed in Section I of this Report. The 1982 Act also complies with the California Constitution which requires the cost of these improvements and services to be assessed based on benefit received rather than by assessed value of the properties being assessed. In accordance with Article XIII D, Section 4 of the California Constitution:

"An agency which proposes to levy an assessment shall identify all parcels which will have a special benefit conferred upon them and upon which an assessment will be imposed. The proportionate special benefit derived by each identified parcel shall be determined in relationship to the entirety of the capital cost of a public improvement, the maintenance and operation expenses of the public improvement or the cost of the property related service being provided. No assessment shall be imposed on any parcel which exceeds the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel. Only special benefits are assessable..."

The method of apportionment described in this Report, and confirmed by the City Council, utilizes commonly accepted engineering practices which have been established pursuant to the 1982 Act and the California Constitution for the allocation of special benefit assessments. The calculation of assessments is based upon the parcel type and the services and improvements provided to equitably apportion the costs based on the special benefit received by each lot or parcel. The special benefit received by each lot or parcel is over and above any general benefit conferred upon said lots or parcels or to the public at large.

DESCRIPTION OF BENEFIT

Special Benefit

The improvements and associated costs have been carefully allocated to the assessable properties within the District based on the special benefit received by those properties, pursuant to the provisions of the California Constitution. The improvements for which the properties will be assessed have been identified as necessary, were required as a part of the development plans specifically for the tract and are also in compliance with the development plans and General Plan of the City. As such, the improvements and continuing maintenance and servicing are strictly the obligation of the properties within the District.

Definition of Special Benefit

The method of apportionment described in this Report is based on the premise that each assessable lot or parcel receives distinct and special benefits from the improvements and services provided, including the visual desirability provided by well-maintained landscaping. In accordance with Article XIII D, Section 4 of the California Constitution:

"Special benefit means a particular and distinct benefit over and above general benefits conferred on real property located in the District or the public at large"



Some of the special benefits associated with local landscaping and lighting improvements are:

- Enhanced desirability of properties due to existence of the improvements and the services provided by the District.
- Improved aesthetic appeal provided by a positive representation of the development, neighborhood and the community.
- Improved ingress and egress to property resulting in enhanced traffic flow, reduced traffic accidents and possible property damage.

ASSESSMENT RANGE FORMULA

It is generally recognized that most budgetary items will be impacted by inflation in future years. In accordance with the California Constitution, Section 53739 (b)(1), assessments "may be adjusted for inflation pursuant to a clearly defined formula..." A formula for an inflationary adjustment is therefore included as part of the maximum assessment within the Districts that allow for such, and was approved by the property owner(s) at the time of formation/annexation. The formula, as described below, allows for annual adjustments to the assessments.

Generally, any new or increased assessment requires certain noticing and meeting requirements by law. The Brown Act excludes certain conditions of a new or increased assessment. These conditions include, "An assessment that does not exceed an assessment formula or range of assessments previously specified in the notice given to the public...and that was previously adopted by the agency..."

The initial maximum assessment for each District was established at the time of annexation into the District. That initial maximum assessment was established at that time and has been adjusted each subsequent fiscal year by the following Assessment Range Formula:

- The Maximum Assessment Rate allowed each fiscal year (the "Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate") shall be based on the initial maximum assessment, adjusted annually by Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Price Index for the month of February, All Urban Consumers, ("CPI") for the San Francisco/Oakland/San Jose area, plus 3%. Should the Bureau of Labor Statistics revise or discontinue the preparation of such index, the City reserves the right to use such revised index or a comparable system to determine fluctuations in the annual cost of living.
- Each fiscal year, the February CPI amount, plus 3% has been applied to the Maximum Assessment Rate established the previous fiscal year to calculate the appropriate Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate for the then current fiscal year.
- If the proposed annual assessment rate for the upcoming fiscal year is less than or equal to the Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate established for that fiscal year, then the proposed annual assessment is not considered an increased assessment.

Beginning in the second fiscal year after the formation of a District, and each fiscal year since, the Maximum Assessment Rate has been recalculated and a new Maximum Assessment Rate (Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate) has been established for each fiscal year using the Assessment Range Formula described above. The Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate has been calculated independent of the annual budget and proposed assessment rate for the given fiscal year.



As stated above, if the proposed annual assessment for any fiscal year does not exceed the Adjusted Maximum Assessment Rate for that year, it is not considered an increased assessment under the terms of Proposition 218 or the Brown Act.

The CPI increase for the one-year period ending in February 2023 is 5.30% (rounded). This amount plus 3% will be applied to the Maximum Assessment for each District, which will establish the Adjusted Maximum Assessment for each District for Fiscal Year 2023-24.

Please refer to the table on page 1 of this Report, "Benefit Assessment Districts Summary", which shows the actual and maximum allowable assessment for each District for the past two years.

This amount will be applied to the Maximum Assessment for each District, which will establish the Adjusted Maximum Assessment for each District for Fiscal Year 2023-24.

To impose a new assessment or increased assessment in excess of the Maximum Assessment Rate for the current fiscal year, as provided by the preceding Assessment Range Formula, the City must comply with the provisions of the California Constitution, Article XIII D, Section 4c that requires a public hearing and certain protest procedures including mailed notice of the public hearing and property owner protest balloting. Property owners must approve the proposed new or increased assessment via a property owner protest balloting process before any such new or increased assessment can be imposed. A protest occurs when, at the public hearing, the returned assessment ballots opposed to the new or increased assessment outweigh the returned ballots in favor of the new or increased assessment, weighting those assessment ballots by the financial obligation of each parcel.

The definition of new or increased assessments includes any assessment which, 1) did not previously exist or, 2) exceeds a previously approved assessment amount or assessment range formula. Any assessment range formula must have been previously adopted by the agency and approved by the property owners in the area where the assessment is imposed.

ASSESSMENT METHODOLOGY

The benefit formula used to determine the financial obligation for each parcel should be based on the improvements benefitting the parcels, as well as the use, or type, of each parcel as compared to other parcels that benefit from said improvements. One of the more common approaches to fairly distributing District costs to the benefitting parcels in maintenance districts such as this utilizes a methodology referred to as the Per Parcel method of apportionment. This method recognizes that each parcel within a particular District benefits equally from the improvements. This is typical when all parcels within the District are of the same type (ex. all single-family dwellings).

Other than Central Hughson and the Sterling Glen III annexation, each District is comprised of a single parcel type – residential. The residential parcels are single-family residential parcels ("SFR") and as such are deemed to benefit equally from the improvements. The "Total Balance to Levy", as shown on the Budget pages, is divided equally among each assessable parcel within the District, determining the annual assessment rate per parcel for that District.

The Central Hughson District is comprised of several property types including single-family residential, commercial, agriculture and undeveloped. The costs are currently spread to those parcels based on the individual parcel size. The Sterling Glen III Annexation is comprised of five single-family residential parcels.



APPENDIX A – ASSESSMENT ROLL

Assessment Roll

Parcel Identification for each lot or parcel within the Districts shall be based on available parcel maps and other property data from the Stanislaus County Assessor's office as they existed at the time this Report was prepared and adopted by the City Council.

A listing of parcels assessed within each District for Fiscal Year 2023-24, along with the corresponding assessment amounts, is included on the following pages. If any parcel submitted for collection is identified by the County Auditor/Controller to be an invalid parcel number for the current fiscal year, a corrected parcel number and/or new parcel numbers will be identified and resubmitted to the County Auditor/Controller. The assessment amount to be levied and collected for the resubmitted parcel(s) shall be based on the method of apportionment and assessment rate approved in this Report. Therefore, if a single parcel has changed to multiple parcels, the assessment amounts applied to each of the new parcels shall be recalculated and applied according to the approved method of apportionment and assessment rate rather than a proportionate share of the original assessment.

Non-assessable lots or parcels include areas of public streets and other roadways (typically not assigned an APN by the County); dedicated public easements, open space areas and rights-of-way, including public greenbelts and parkways; utility rights-of-way; common areas; landlocked parcels; small parcels vacated by the County, bifurcated lots and any other property that cannot be developed or has specific development restrictions. These types of parcels are considered to receive little or no benefit from the improvements and are therefore, exempted from assessment.

Staff Recommendation:

Accept the resignation of Ramon Bawanan from the Hughson City Council, effective September 1, 2023, and direct staff on the process for filling the vacancy.

Background:

During the July 24, 2023 regular meeting, Councilmember Ramon Bawanan shared with the Council, staff and public that he was in the process of moving outside the City limits of Hughson and would therefore be resigning from the Hughson City Council in the near future.

On July 28, 2023, Councilmember Bawanan formally submitted a letter of resignation to City staff indicating that it would be effective September 1, 2023.

Government Code 36512(b) sets forth the procedures for filling a vacancy on the City Council. Within 60 days of the resignation, the Council must either appointment someone to fill the vacancy or call for a special election to fill the vacancy. If the Council decides to call a special election, the election must be held at the next regularly scheduled election.

Discussion:

If the City Council would like to fill the vacancy by appointment, City staff will advertise the vacancy for 30 days by way of the City's website, social media platforms, the monthly newsletter, and the Hughson Chronicle. The Notice of Vacancy will also be posted as required.

Applications received by the deadline are collected, and eligibility is verified with the Stanislaus County Registrar of Voters.

The goal would be to bring the appointment for consideration during the first meeting in October (9th) for the Hughson City Council to make a decision well in advance of the 60-day deadline.

The City Council can determine how to evaluate the applications received.

Council may consider one of the following options and/or provide additional feedback for choosing an appointment process:

- Review applications at the October 9, 2023, regular meeting and make an appointment to fill the vacancy at that same meeting. Formal interviews would be conducted, as in the past with Planning Commission/Parks, Recreation and Entertainment Commission appointments.
- 2. Review applications at the October 9, 2023, regular meeting and make an appointment to fill the vacancy at that same meeting. Formal interviews would not be conducted, but the Council will have the option to ask questions of the applicants based on the information submitted.
- 3. Call a special meeting to review applications, interview applicants (scheduled) and schedule to fill the vacancy at the October 9, 2023 regular meeting. This was found to be the practice the last time that the City Council had the option to make an appointment due to a vacancy.

If the Council opts to conduct a special meeting for the review of applications, it will need to be scheduled from October 2-6, 2023, in order to be able to make an appointment at the October 9th regular meeting.

Fiscal Impact:

There are no fiscal impacts associated with the acceptance of the letter of resignation. Costs associated with filling the vacancy depend on whether it is through an appointment or a special election. The latter would require coordination with the Stanislaus County Registrar of Voters and include expenses significantly more than an appointment process due to the associated election costs.

Staff Recommendations:

Adopt Resolution No. 2023-43, approving the 2023 American Rescue Plan Act Funds Spending Plan.

Background:

Signed into law on March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 ("ARPA") provides \$1.9 trillion worth of federal COVID-19 relief. The relief package includes \$350 billion in additional funding for state and local governments, more commonly designated as the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds ("SLFRF"). The local funding portion is approximately \$130 billion, allocated to cities and counties.

The City of Hughson's funding allocation of SLFRF funds is \$1,809,708 and on June 27, 2022, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2022-31, American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Spending Plan (Exhibit B).

Throughout the last year, staff have worked on the projects listed in the ARPA Spending Plan and have completed many of the projects under the amount originally estimated. It should be noted that without going out for bids, staff are simply estimating a dollar amount that they think a project may cost and the actual costs often come in below or above what was originally estimated. This leaves funding that can be reallocated for additional projects.

Approximately \$775,000 in funds have been spent and there are several long-term projects on the ARPA Project List, totaling \$836,050 that have not yet been completed including:

Downtown Project - \$200,000 - Community Development is working on several different projects, including decorative lighting, murals, sidewalk art, pedestrian walkways, and a downtown sign.

Sidewalk Repairs - \$50,000 - To City Council today for approval.

Hughson Avenue ADA - \$100,000 – With engineering to design plans.

Business Assistance for ADA upgrades - \$100,000

Master Fee Schedule Consultant - \$75,000 - Finance is currently working on an RFP.

one-time historical document scanning - \$125,000 – a part-time contractor is working on this scanning of documents.

Water/stormwater SCADA Upgrades - \$55,000

Starn Park Camera System - \$5,000

Trailer with Generator (replacement of old DUI trailer) – 30,000

Sound panels for new office space - \$3,250

Kitchen Upgrades - \$78,100

Council Canopy replacement - \$5,757

Stove - \$8,940.02

These longer-term projects continue to be pursued leaving approximately \$215,000 to reallocate to new projects.

Discussion:

In analyzing opportunities for the best use of ARPA funds, City staff reviewed the eligible and ineligible uses and maintained the following guiding principles in bringing the projects forward to the City Council for approval:

- SLFRF funds are one-time funds and as such, their use should be applied primarily to nonrecurring expenditures.
- Care should be taken to avoid creating new programs and add-ons to existing programs that require an ongoing financial commitment and/or staffing to manage the programming.
- Assist the City residents by maintaining vital public services and improving the City of Hughson as a whole.
- Fund projects that improve the business climate in Hughson and assist businesses within the City limits by ensuring a strong, resilient, and equitable recovery.
- Fund projects that have no other funding source and/or are one-time purchases/projects that are sustainable and will not place a greater strain on the City's General Fund budget in future years.
- Fund projects that will improve efficiency in City operations.
- Fund projects that improve the work environment and improve the health and well-being of City staff.

Approximately \$215,000 in funds remain and the additional projects identified by City staff are detailed on the project list attached. (Exhibit A) and include the following projects that total \$216,100:

Economic and Workforce Development Projects:

• VOLT Scholarships - \$25,000

City Facility Infrastructure upgrades have been identified:

- Hughson Civic Center Rendering, design and CEQA \$100,000
- Paint the outside of City Hall and the Sr. Community Center \$30,000
- New gutters on City Hall and Sr. Community Center \$5,000
- Starn Shade replacement and repaint the frame \$5,000
- Repaint Starn Patio Frame (concession side) \$4,100
- Euclid playground shade \$23,000
- Concrete Cutter \$7,000 (this was on the original list for \$4,000)
- Asphalt Grinder \$17,000

Lebright Lighting was considered for ARPA funding; however, there is other Parks funding that can be used for this purpose in the future.

One of the stipulations for being a recipient of the SLFRF funds is to submit the required Project and Expenditure Reports. The City of Hughson is a non-entitlement unit (NEU), which is the term applied to local governments typically serving less than 50,000 in population. The reporting requirement for NEUs is on an annual basis. Reports are submitted through the Treasury's Reporting Portal. The first and second Project and Expenditure Reports have been submitted in 2022 and 2023.

In general, a recipient may only use funds to cover costs incurred during the period beginning March 3, 2021 and ending December 31, 2024. A recipient must return any funds not obligated by December 31, 2024, and any funds not expended to cover such obligations by December 31, 2026.

The City's SLFRF disbursement has been reported as a revenue loss. This gives the City the maximum flexibility in utilizing the funds for general governmental services, allowing the City to prioritize and address a variety of projects and objectives citywide without being subject to the more restrictive requirements of categorical spending.

Fiscal Impact:

The City of Hughson's funding allocation of local fiscal recovery funds is \$1,809,708.

Approximately \$775,000 in funds have been spent and there are several long-term projects on the ARPA Project List, totaling approximately \$836,050 that have not yet been completed, leaving approximately \$213,500 to be allocated to the 2023 ARPA Project List.

The attached ARPA Project lists \$216,100 in estimated costs for the projects identified. This amount is an estimate, as City staff need to acquire bids and formal estimates for items subject to the informal and formal bidding procedures set forth in the Purchasing Policy.

The City's Purchasing Policy requires items that are equal to or greater than \$15,000 to be brought back to Council for consent, and then Finance will make subsequent budget adjustments as the project costs are finalized. For items less than \$15,000 staff will make budget adjustments and proceed.

A RESOLUTION OF CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HUGHSON APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER, OR DESIGNEE, TO EXECUTE THE PROPOSED AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT (ARPA) SPENDING PLAN IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE CITY'S PURCHASING POLICY

WHEREAS, the State and Local Coronavirus Fiscal Recovery Funds legislation, part of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), was signed into law by President Biden on March 11, 2021. The bill includes \$350 billion in funds allocated to recovering from the pandemic and restoring the economy. \$65.1 billion is allocated to states, metropolitan cities, and non-entitlement units of local government and of that, \$19.5 billion is allocated to non-entitlement units of government; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of the Treasury will oversee and administer these payments to the State of California for non-entitlement cities (population less than 50,000), which includes the City of Hughson; and

WHEREAS, the City of Hughson received \$1,809,708 through ARPA; and

WHEREAS, the City of Hughson desires to spend the ARPA funding in the most careful and advantageous manner to the City and on June 27, 2022, the City Council adopted Resolution 2022-31, approving the 2022 ARPA Project Listing (Exhibit B), to identify priority project needs for the City; and

WHEREAS, the City of Hughson has identified additional projects and created Exhibit A, 2023 ARPA Projects Listing.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED, that the City Council of the City of Hughson hereby approves and authorizes the City Manager, or designee, to execute the proposed American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Spending Plan in accordance with the City's Purchasing Policy.
